
One thing is for sure: students are looking forward to the next year here at JMPHS.


Q: When did you start playing sports?

National News: Baby Formula Shortage

There is an Formula shortage across the United states and it is hurting infants and the low come families that don't have the resources to get the formulas. While the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced on Thursday that a stopped infant formula factory — one of the main causes of the statewide shortage – could reopen as soon as next week, store shelves could be empty for weeks. A lot of stores and pharmacies have already limited the amount of the formula a family can buy at a time Leaving many people with nothing.

Some parents are so desperate to have formula for their infants that they even tried making it from scratch. The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) strongly suggests that parents shouldn't make formula from scratch. Why is there currently a formula shortage you may ask? The answer is that there are many reasons. In February, Abbott Nutrition, the top producer of baby formula in the US shut down. After four infants were hospitalized with bacterial illnesses and two of them died after drinking baby formula made at its Sturgis, Michigan factory, the company initiated voluntary recall and the factory shut down. Why would it matter if one factory shut down? This is the largest factory in the US so it impacts a lot.
