
Sport JMPHS Tennis

The Re-Opening of Wild Adventures

The large theme park, Wild Adventures, just opened back up on April 3rd after taking a break to renovate and meet Covid-19 precautions. People have been awaiting the opening of Wild Adventures. The entrance was filled with a mile-long line of cars and the parking lot was quickly packed. April Showers Prove Dangerous

Through the second weekend of April, some storms caused power outages, torn roofing, flattened buildings, and mangled vehicles. Some states that got hit with these storms were just hit previously in mid to late March. Several people were injured and at least three people have died.

Severe weather hit the South, bringing large hail to Texas and Alabama and leaving many vehicles damaged. Roads in Mississippi were flooded and there were dangerous winds, lightning, and a tornado reported in Florida and Louisiana. In Palmetto, Louisiana there was a stretch of homes that a tornado ripped through, causing seven injured and one dead. Eight homes were damaged along with about five or six vehicles. Debris from the damage was found in neighboring fields. Also in Shreveport, Louisiana a tree fell through a 48-year-old man's house and ended up killing him.

A convenience store in Panama City, Florida was severely damaged by the cause of a tornado that touched down Saturday. The store's roof flew off and crashed into a house. At the time there were only three people in the store and a few in the house, none of them faced any injuries. People were helping clean up the store and a local woman has started raising money for the store owners to help it get back up and running. This information was found mostly from the article "One Killed in Louisiana as Storms Hammer South; Buildings Destroyed in the Florida Panhandle" by Jan Wenser Childs. In Mississippi some roads were closed due to severe flooding, leaving roads completely underwater. Alternate routes were given. When approaching a flooded road the safest thing to do is turn around and find a different route to take.

All of the states impacted received power outages. More than 14,000 outages were reported in Florida, about 10,000 in Louisiana, and more than 13,000 in Mississippi. In Florida, a 17-year-old girl died after being electrocuted by a downed power line. Her car collided with a knocked-down power line, caused by a falling tree. After her car collided with the other person's vehicle, her car caught fire on the driver's side. When trying to escape she stepped onto the active power line, causing fatal electrocution.

When faced with dangerous storms it is important to stay somewhere safe like in a shelter that is in a safe location. It is best to keep your vehicle in a garage or on higher ground if flooding occurs. Make sure you organize important documents, create a home inventory, have an emergency kit, and have an easily accessible emergency fund.



Invasive Species in Our State

In the state of Florida, countless invasive species ravage the local economy and ecosystem. Unfortunately, many of these species can be seen out your window right now. In fact, you can see these plants on the walk from Lanier Field to the school. Costing the county of Madison the presence of local forms of wildlife, these plants and animals continue to damage our community. Luckily, some of these florae and fauna can be easily identified by the untrained eye.

For example, the arguably most familiar is Kudzu, a plant that wraps itself around trees, blocking sunlight and slowly killing our trees. In an interview with Casey Sullivan, a forestry technician for the United States Forest Service, and previously an ecosystem restoration technician for the Nature Conservancy, he said "the best way to deal with invasive species is early detection and a rapid response". In his line of work, he says Kudzu is likely the worst invasive species in the North Florida area, as it smothers out the native plants and trees, and eventually affects the wildlife.





For the people in the trap team here at school, if you are driving from Highway 90, and onto Roller Coaster Road to the field when the road turns to dirt, you can see Cogon Grass on both sides of the road. Native to Asia and Africa, this species was brought over and it grew rapidly in our soil. It crowds out our native plants and sucks the nutrition from the soil. Originally, it was introduced as a forage plant in the 1930s, but it quickly got out of hand.

One of the most dangerous invasive species is the Wild Hog. Coming over with the settlers from Europe, the natives saw it as a destructive beast, and for good reason. It roots through the ground, looking for food, and when there is a drove of them in an area, it looks like the land was plowed. This



puts a strain on the native animals' food supply. Not only do they damage agriculture, but they can grow to dangerous sizes, with the current record holder in Florida weighing over a thousand pounds. Wild hogs have massive tusks that can cause severe bleeding to even people, and they move very quickly, often catching the unaware by surprise. Luckily, it's nothing a few well-placed bullets can't handle, and there are few regulations on hunting Wild Hogs. Deriving from the pig, the Wild Hog is edible, and it is said to taste like pork but is leaner with a more gamey flavor because of its diet.

With as unfortunately common as many invasive species are, it may seem like some plants and animals were always here, but they are successful at driving out native wildlife and spreading rapidly. At the moment, it may not seem like too much of a problem, but these species work night and day to multiply at the expense of whatever was living here before, silently but steadily causing damage. Many of these species were brought here with good intentions, Kudzu was meant to prevent washout and Hernando de Soto just wanted some fresh pork on his expedition for gold, but when new flora and fauna are brought to Florida, their damage is unpredictable. This is why we all need to do our part to keep our beautiful state in its pristine condition.
